The site of the original St Peter's Church is located on the east side of the

and flooring were pitsawn and installed throughout by local tradesman, Louis Leveman. To one side of the church Fr Lecaille added a single room for his personal use, although he rarely stayed in one location for any length of time. This small cramped area became his principal home for almost 40 years. By 1874 a choir loft had been added above the main door of St Peter's and a church bell was purchased. The bell is now located between the Greenough Convent [Place No. 46] and the present St Peter's Church [Place No. 45] in the Central Greenough Historic Settlement. From the beginning the church doubled as a school for the local children. St Peter's Church was badly damaged by the 1888 flood and was replaced in 1909 by a more substantial building erected next to the Greenough Convent, also called St Peter's.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The site of St Peter's Church has very high historic significance as it was the first church to be built in the Victoria District. For many years the chapel fulfilled an important role in the religious and educational life of people on the Greenough Flats. Further the place is closely associated with Fr Lecaille who is credited with laying the foundations for the catholic church in the district. The site is also evidence of the disastrous impact of the 1888 flood on the Greenough community.
